After Chance passed on, Donna continued her passion for volunteer work with Gracie Buford, a Great Pyrenees/Golden Retriever mix, for a period of time. Donna has worked with Golden Retrievers Pal and Jimmy along with her current team mate, Roxy, a rescued bull mastiff. Donna's volunteer work has taken her to over 40 different facilities across the metro area.

As chairman of the **Pets for Life** annual Pet Parties, Donna has personally made doggie treats, designed and stuffed gift bags, solicited vendors for the contents of our gift bags, and coordinated the "human" food selections. When **Pets for Life** needed someone to oversee donations and fund raising, Donna, at her own expense, took classes at Johnson

County Community College to learn techniques in Grant Applications. Donna has become a one-woman fundraiser for **Pets for Life**. Her tireless effort has created a continuous stream of grant money from foundations, companies, and individuals. In spite of current economic conditions, Donna's carefully worded and expertly crafted applications continually yield positive results.

Donna's ability to see the big picture of **Pets for Life** – how things are working now as well as the direction the future may bring, keeps the Board of Directors on course. 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KANSAS CITY'S PETS FOR LIFE LAUNCHES LEASH PALS™

A Program to Educate Children for the Prevention of Dog Bites

Kansas City's **Pets for Life** proudly presents Leash Pals™ a 4-lesson elementary level curriculum designed to help children enjoy safer, more productive relationships with Man's Best Friend. Beginning this fall, qualified **Pets for Life** volunteers, along with their certified therapy dogs, will visit area schools and facilitate an interactive program which includes mixed-media presentations, role-playing exercises, and hands-on learning.

The Leash Pals™ program was written by dog trainer and Certified Humane Education Specialist Suezanne M. Law, and includes body language instruction to help children understand canine communication and education in appropriate interactions between kids and the dogs they will encounter.

"Depending on whom you ask, there are between 60 and 80 million dogs in America – more than one in every three homes. "That's a lot of dogs," says Law. "And according to the CDC, an American has a one in fifty chance of being bitten by a dog every year".

In fact, according to DogBiteLaw.com, of all age-groups, children – especially boys aged five to nine – experience the highest incidence of dog-bite injuries. Half of these incidents involve a dog living within the child's own home. 77% of injuries are to the child's face, head and neck.

Through their new Leash Pals curriculum, the **Pets for Life** organization wants to decrease those odds. Says **Pets for Life** President, Joe Sanches, "Much of the conflict prevalent in human-canine interaction could be easily avoided if humans would take one simple step: learn dog body-language, and teach it to children, too".

The Leash Pals™ curriculum will begin in a limited number of schools and facilities this fall and will soon be available in all of the counties that the **Pets for Life** organization serves: Clay, Cass, and Jackson counties in Missouri; Johnson, Miami and Wyandotte counties in Kansas.

Delmar Gardens of Lenexa

Delmar Gardens of Lenexa is a 24-hour care facility, including units for Alzheimer's, physical therapy and skilled nursing. Seniors (age 60+) live in a home-like atmosphere and enjoy a variety of social and recreational programs.

Three volunteer teams from **Pets for Life** make regular visits to Delmar Gardens. Shan Leatherman and her dog Joey along with Paula Fanning and Itty Bitty visit the third Saturday of each month. Chuck Williams and his Whippet, Deevo, were an integral part of this team until Deevo passed away earlier this summer.

Since 1987, residents and staff at Delmar Gardens have eagerly anticipated the **Pets for Life** team visits. Spreading smiles, laughter, cheer and unconditional puppy love, the residents at Delmar Gardens love their **Pets for Life** volunteer teams. Following are some thoughts and comments from team members who frequent Delmar:

In the early years, a nurse told me that this patient had not spoken a word since she arrived at Delmar. The minute I put Sidney (my cat) in her lap, she was petting him and talking. The nursing staff was shocked that the resident was able to talk. It really warms your heart to know that you are making a difference.

Another resident had a limited range of motion and I remember her trying to pet Joey, who is the perfect wheel chair height. The nurses squealed with delight and exclaimed that they had been trying to get her to move her arm. Miraculously there she was, petting Joey and loving every stroke.

There is a gal in the Alzheimers ward that is not fond of people but lights up the minute we bring the dogs in. She frequently lets us know that dogs are smarter than people, and I always smile and agree. She is instantly delighted to see her dear doggy friends and it makes her day (and ours).

As the years passed by, the amazing reaction from patients became routine and I didn't marvel in it as much as I did in the beginning. I know the power of therapy pets. One of their greatest attributes is that they are great ice breakers. There are many residents who never have visitors, who are very lonely and are excited by the prospect of having someone they could talk to and pet. If only for the briefest of moments, you can tell it makes their day. Many residents make special requests for us to make sure we stop in to see them when we visit. It's such a joy to know people look forward to our visits. Because many residents cannot bring their animals to live with them at Delmar, connecting with our dogs gives them a moment of security, comfort and a

sense of the familiar. Ask any volunteer team and they will confirm that we, the team, get as much or more from our visits than the patients. It's rewarding and a win-win for all involved. It reminds us that life is precious and while our dogs don't live as long as humans do they will in some ways have contributed more in their life time than many people do. The impact they make is pretty impressive.
