MANY WILL MISS SEEING JAKE 🔉

Thank you Terry Montgomery for sharing your precious memories about Jake.



I think one of my favorite memories was during a visit to Crittenton's inpatient resident population. A young teen patient was kneeling, petting Jake and looking at him adoringly. Patients only receive permission to sign up to visit the dogs if they have been on good behavior. The teen noted, "I've actually been here a while, but I've been "on color" (coded behavior violations) and haven't been able to come down. They sighed and said, "I know the rules are there for a reason, but I just think that I wouldn't get in so much trouble if I had a dog all the time."

When Jake's lump became palpable a few months after its removal in November 2023, I knew the kids would ask about it and I decided not to lie. I told them that all we could do was give Jake love and each visit with them were his best days. One cried and more than one shared their stories of grief, for a beloved grandfather and pets of their own; things that don't often come up, that were healing for them to share.

FACILITIES REQUESTING VOLUNTEERS

Benton House of Raymore 2100 Johnston Drive LRaymore, MO 64083

This facility requests visits in their memory care unit. There is a maximum of 24 residents and the visits will take place in the common room. Mornings around 10:00 and afternoons around 3:30 are preferred.

The residents will be assembled prior to the volunteer's arrival and aides will be able to assist if needed. Wednesday is not an open day for visits.

Rockhill Manor

4235 Locust Street Kansas City, MO 64110

This is a large, assisted living facility whose clients are typically seniors with mental health issues. There are about 160 clients and visits would take place in several common areas on the first floor. A Courtside in the back of the facility is also an option. They prefer visits in the afternoons between 1:00 and 4:00, but there is room between breakfast and lunch, 9:30 to 11:00.

The facility used to have a therapy cat in residence. The coordinator states that residents form long lines when the director brings in his dog so a visit from a therapy team would be greatly appreciated.
